PRESIDENT'S REPORT



With pleasure, privilege, and a touch of relief , I pen my final report as the President of the National Council of Women of Queensland, having dedicated four one-year terms to serve in this role.

A notable development during my tenure was the change in the NCWQ Patron. On October 31, 2021, we bid farewell to His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey AC CVO, who diligently served Queensland for over 7 years. Stepping into this role is Her Excellency the Honourable Dr Jeannette Young AC PSM, the former Chief Medical Officer of Queensland.

Upon assuming the NCWQ Presidency in late 2019, the global challenge of COVID-19 emerged, prompting a shift to virtual committee meetings due to movement restrictions. The ever-changing regulations led to the cancellation of the 2020 bursary presentation. Despite these limitations, the NCWQ committee utilized the period to enhance organisational processes. In 2020, under the guidance of our Treasurer, Mrs Ramona McGregor, we adopted the cloud-based accounting software Xero, embraced internet banking, and updated the NCWQ website with a community grant. Google Workspace became our collaborative platform, accompanied by Google Drive for digital storage. With assistance from various committee members, led by Mrs Sandy Smith, our Woolloongabba office closed, and digitised records found a home at the State Library. Concurrently, the NCWQ Bursary applications transitioned to an online platform, thanks to the expertise of NCWQ's Webmaster, Mr Kley McPherson.

The embrace of technology led to a rejuvenation of the NCWQ committee membership, attracting women still active in the workforce. This shift resulted in an increase in membership, with affiliate numbers rising from 35 in 2019 to 38 in 2023 and associate membership growing from 45 to 86 during the same period. Noteworthy is the gifting of 6 months of membership from January to June 2021, aligning NCWQ's membership year with other NCW councils across Australia.

Under the guidance of Bursary Programme Manager Kathy Cavanagh, the NCWQ bursary program, a hallmark initiative, maintained stability at approximately 35 bursaries per year. The cancellation of the 2020 presentation prompted the creation of the first electronic bursary yearbook, a tradition upheld since then. Venue trials over four years culminated in presentations at the Old Museum at Spring Hill in 2021, Parliament House in 2022, and the Women's College at the University of Queensland in 2023.

As the elected NCWQ President, I earned a representational seat on the National Council of Women of Australia (NCWA) board. In 2020, I was nominated as NCWA President-Elect, subsequently becoming the 37th President in 2021, following the legacy of past NCWQ Presidents Elsie Blyth (1945-1948) and Dr Laurel Mcintosh (1979-1982).

In May 2022, I led the Australian delegation to the International Council of Women (ICW) General Assembly in Avignon, France and was elected to the role of the ICW Assistant Treasurer. Since my appointment, I have participated in in-person board meetings in Beirut and Manila, attended the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) 67 in New York (March 2023), and led the Australian delegation to the ICW Executive Committee Meeting in Manila (November 2023). Future ICW engagements will be shared via NCWA briefings.

At the 2022 ICW GA meeting, I engaged with the Indonesian Chair of Delegation for the W20 summit in Lake Toba, Medan, Indonesia. Invited as guests of KOWANI, the National Council of Women of Indonesia, I established connections that marked the beginning of my involvement with W20, the women engagement group for the G20 summit. This year, I represented Australia at the 2023 W20 summit in Chennai, India and presented Australia's draft National Strategy on the Care and Support Economy.

Simultaneously, in May 2022, I was approached by a member of the Prime Minister and Cabinet's office, leading to my appointment in September 2022 as an inaugural member of the Women Economic Equality Taskforce (WEET), operating under the Federal Minister for Women Senator Katy Gallagher and chaired by Sam Mostyn. WEET's achievements included reinstating the Parenting Payment (Single) for parents with children up until 14 years of age, abolishing the Parents Next program, extending Paid Parental Leave (PPL), eliminating the Childcare Subsidy Activity Test, increasing Commonwealth Rental Assistance, and boosting payrates for aged care workers. Balancing roles at state, national, and international levels, alongside WEET responsibilities, offered a unique vantage point to assess the power of advocacy work by women. Collaborating virtually with Suzanne Manning, President of the NCWNZ, through ICW, and representing Australia at the 2023 W20 summit in Chennai, India, expanded my understanding of advocacy dynamics on an international scale.

Gratitude goes to my grand-daughter Leni, my children Chris, Rika, Jess, Ryan, Olivia and Harry, Team Elements, Team Conpago, Team NCWQ, Team NCWA, and my justice and advocacy champion, Brendan Rook. Concluding this report, I thank all NCWQ members and supporters for the initial opportunity that paved the way for my amazing journey.

MINUTES 117th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Held via Zoom on Saturday 19th November 2022

1.0 OPENING AND WELCOME: Chair Chiou See Anderson, NCWQ President, declared the Annual General Meeting open at 10:10 a.m. with a welcome to all present.

ATTENDANCE: As per zoom registration sheet, whereby a quorum was established.

APOLOGIES: As per list read along with Proxies by Recording Secretary Sandy Smith

2.0 MINUTES OF 2021 AGM: Moved **Ronda Nix** OAM seconded **Ramona McGregor** that the Minutes of the 2021 Annual General Meeting circulated to all members electronically be taken as read. **Carried**

Moved by **Barbara Currell** seconded **Kathy Cavanagh** that the Minutes be signed as a true and accurate record of the National Council of Women of Queensland 116th Annual General Meeting held in 2021. **Carried**

3.0 PRESIDENT'S REPORT: included in the Annual Report. Chiou See spoke of the challenges and advantages associated with being involved at State, National and International levels. She announced Brisbane is hosting the International Council of Women (ICW) General Assembly in 2025 which coincides with the NCWQ 120th anniversary. Chiou See expanded on the six priorities in her report including a Constitution Review, opening up meetings, looking at ways to be responsive to first nations, a National Survey to enhance the advocacy role, liaising to enhance advocacy for women particularly Ukraine women and the upcoming 16 days of activism to end domestic violence.

Marjorie Voss moved, seconded Avril Kent, that the President's Annual Report be adopted. Carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT



This report covers the period from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023. The Accountant's Verification Statement and the Financial Statements for the above period, including a comparison to the Financial Statements for 2021/22, are set out in the Annual Report.

The net asset position at 30 June 2023 was \$156,733 (surplus), and we consider the association is solvent given the high asset reserves and net overall profit position.

Following the hard work from the committee throughout the financial year, and a generous bequest received by the organisation, NCWQ closed in a net profit position of \$106,192. Importantly, the organisation was fortunate to be the honoured recipient of a bequest from Vale Dr Laurel Macintosh OBE. The committee, members, friends and family of NCWQ are incredibly grateful for this bequest, and send our thanks to Laurel's family.

To allow for comparability, we normalise this to a net profit of \$6,912, down from the prior year profit of \$9,555. This profit is largely due to the revenues generated from both membership dues and function surplus throughout the year, being the organisation's largest revenue streams currently.

NCWQ's membership fees income of \$7,878 was largely on par compared to the prior year (\$7,702). We thank our 37 affiliated and 90 associated members for their ongoing support throughout the 2023 financial year.

Surplus from events and functions (including donations) saw a decrease in the 2022/23 financial year, with net surplus being \$5,413 (down from \$7,452 from the prior year). However, as we look to compare to the pre-COVID-19 financials, function surplus were around \$5,500 per year. Therefore, the organisation has returned to pre-COVID-19 levels.

As my last term as Treasurer comes to an end, I would like to thank the committee and members for their support over the last three years. It has been a pleasure assisting in the Treasury function, and I hope to continue in other capacities going forward.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the association and for use by members of the association. The executive committee have determined that the company is not a reporting entity and therefore there is no requirement to apply Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements (Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views) in the preparation and presentation of these statements.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act and the following Australian Accounting Standards.

AAS5: Materiality

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are drawn up using the accruals basis of accounting. The accruals basis of accounting recognises income and expenses when they are earned or incurred as opposed to a cash receipts and disbursements basis.

(b) Income Taxes

The operations of the association are exempt from income tax under the principals of not-for-profit and mutuality.

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The organisation is not registered or required to be registered for GST.

ENVIRONMENT REPORT



A range of environmental issues was researched and reported on during the year including the condition of the Great Barrier Reef, greenhouse gas emissions and measures being taken to transition to net zero targets and the use of biodegradable and biocompatible material made entirely from plant protein for the manufacture of plastic.

Great Barrier Reef (GBR) (SDGs 13,14): Australian Institute of Marine Science (AIMS)'s Annual Summary Report1 on Coral Reef Condition for 2021/22 recorded, in the 87 representative reefs surveyed, northern and central GBR had their highest amount of coral cover since AIMS began monitoring 36 years ago. However, average coral cover in the southern region decreased from 38% in 2021 to 34%, due to ongoing crown-of-thorns starfish outbreaks. In 2022/23 using surveys of 111 representative reefs, AIMS showed the average hard coral cover in the three regions decreased slightly but within 95% credible limits; However, hard coral cover on individual reefs was highly variable mostly between 10% and 50%. There were minimal other stressors, i.e. no severe cyclones impacting the GBR in 22/23. The 2022 mass bleaching event, crown-of-thorns starfish outbreaks, coral disease and Tropical Cyclone Tiffany in January 2022, are considered to have paused the recovery of hard coral cover on many reefs. While most coral reefs of the GBR have demonstrated resilience in the absence of acute disturbances, the increasing frequency and spatial extent of bleaching events forecasted remains a concern along with the persistent threat of crownof-thorns starfish2.

Following the UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation recognising that Australia was making significant progress putting the GBR on a stronger and more sustainable path, addressing climate change, water quality, and sustainable fishing, the World Heritage Committee decided not to list the GBR as 'in danger'3.

Greenhouse gas emissions (SDGs 7,11,12,13): The Australian Government has committed to a net Greenhouse gas emissions reduction target of 43% below 2005 levels by 2030 and net zero emissions by 20504, and the Queensland Government to 70% renewable energy by 2032, and 80% by 20355. Energy production and use comprise most of Australia's and Queensland's emissions6,7.

While Australia currently emits only 1.22% of global GHG emissions, some major trading partners emit rather more [China (24.23%), India (6.76%) Japan(2.28%), South Korea (1.31%)]8. Major markets for Australia's resources and energy exports in 2021-22, A\$ billions were China 140, India 27, Japan 54, and South Korea 33. The mining sector contributes 13.7% of Australia's GDP gross domestic product9.

Steel production contributes about seven per cent of global GHG emissions. Most crude steel is produced from iron ore reduced by coke produced from metallurgical coal. Australia is the world's largest producer of iron ore (53% of world exports in 20/21) and metallurgical coal (56%in 2021)9. China and India rank among the top producers of steel10. Steelmakers face international pressure to change their carbon-intensive processes. CSIRO is working with major iron ore producers across a range of relevant areas to develop some of the key technologies that will help get steel to net-zero, from lifting ore grades, to hydrogen for energy and reduction to carbon capture11.

To make real progress towards global net zero carbon, innovative research, especially in the energy sector, needs to be strongly supported and partnerships with companies of trading partners further developed.

Fusion Energy (SDGs 7,9,13,17) with its environmental credentials may be a step closer to realisation. Two major branches of fusion energy research, Inertial Confinement Fusion and Magnetic Confinement Fusion, are being actively pursued. On 13 December 2022, the U.S. Department of Energy announced a major scientific breakthrough after decades of research, through its Inertial Confinement Fusion program, using the National Ignition Facility, at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. More energy was produced from fusion than the laser energy used to drive it12. This has the potential to provide a new clean and sustainable energy source in the future.

The magnetic confinement fusion approach is being used on the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor project13 which aims to prove fusion can be utilized commercially. Several fusion experiments have kept extremely hot plasma trapped long enough to encourage fusion to occur, demonstrating the ability to replicate conditions found inside the Sun. While there are other scientific and engineering problems, there is hope the sun can be mimicked to provide a limitless clean energy source.

Plastic from Biomass (SDGs 12,15): Steps are being made to eradicate the need for single-use plastics by using biodegradable and biocompatible material made entirely from plant protein to replace synthetic materials and polymers currently used in the manufacture of plastic14,15,16. The Government has also announced initiatives to reduce landfill and to lift recycling capacity.



EDUCATION REPORT



Girls and STEM

At the end of 2022 I considered what both the State and Federal Government were doing to encourage girls to pursue studies in STEM. Both levels of government were aware of the problem and were developing various projects to support this initiative. The Qld government introduced a STEM Girl Power Initiative which was a 12 month programme that encouraged girls to participate in STEM by engaging in a range of exciting STEM experiences and it invited them to inspire other students, by being a STEM ambassador in their school and community.



The STEM Girl Power initiative is continuing. In 2023 '61 students from across Queensland and Papua New Guinea attended the 2023 STEM Girl Power camp.

For their final activity, students participated in world-class biomedical education experiences at SPARQ-Ed and the Translational Research Institute. (1)

The Federal Government promoted a **'Curious Minds'** initiative. This was a mentoring program which "supported more female students to ignite their interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). It acknowledged that 'women were less likely than men to pursue higher education in STEM' and that women still make up less than 20% of enrolments in STEM degrees. (2)

The Curious Minds initiative is also continuing and girls are encouraged to take part.

International Women's Day - DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality

International Women's Day was the 8th March and UN Women which is a United Nations entity dedicated to gender equality and the empowerment of women celebrated with the theme "DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality."(4)

"a persistent gender gap in digital access keeps women from unlocking technology's full potential. Their underrepresentation in STEM education and careers remains a major barrier to their participation in tech design and governance. And the pervasive threat of online gender-based violence—coupled with a lack of legal recourse—too often forces them out of the digital spaces they do occupy. "(4)



We need to realise that it is not enough to encourage girls to do courses and work in STEM. We must all realise that any disparity that is in place in our society will simply be transferred to the digital world. Access to education, employment, healthcare, and other human rights are increasingly dependent on an internet connection and the knowledge on how best to use it. This is a challenge for many in our society but it is exacerbated by poverty and unfortunately there is a poverty gap overall between men and women as can be seen by the results of many surveys.

The increased use of Artificial Intelligence also presents a problem in our digital world particularly for women. This is mainly because the systems depend on the base Data used as well as the Algorithm design.

'And while there is agreement that lots of good data can indeed help close gender gaps, there remain concerns that if the "right" questions are not being asked in the data collection process (including by women), gender gaps can actually widen when algorithms are misinformed. This does not only have negative impacts on women, but also business and economies' (5,6)

It is important that women become more involved in AI particularly in setting up new models and incorporating AI into Business and other areas in our society and everyone should be aware that if the base data is biased or the algorithm then the results could be catastrophic. We need more girls in STEM but also to pursue careers in this growing field. (5,6)

Artificial Intelligence and ChatGPT

Al is becoming more widespread and is becoming an intrinsic part of our lives.

The increased availability and use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Education has created great interest in the Education Sector but also creates some concerns and challenges. The most common current use in schools is the use of ChatGPT. 'ChatGPT is a natural language processing tool driven by AI technology that allows human-like conversations and much more.(8) It can answer questions compose essays and much more. Some schools have approached the use positively. They see it as a very useful tool to help teachers prepare work for students. Professor Sam Sellar, a research dean in education policy at the University of South Australia explains 'I think there is certainly the potential to use these new tools in ways that can make teachers' work more professionally engaging and create more time for them to do what they do best, which is teaching in the classroom! Students can also gain. 'Many experts think it's a potentially revolutionary tool for students, too. And they see an urgent need to teach kids about the technology, which is likely to be central to many of their future working lives'(6)

It is important to teach students both the positive and negative aspects of any technology available whether it is using Social Media or ChatGPT. 'Among the pitfalls (with Chat GTP and also Social Media) is its unreliability — it frequently spits out complete inaccuracies, fabricated data, made-up quotes and information influenced by

the technology's in-built biases. One teacher said' Students are taught to understand and work in this environment. 'One student explains she has been using it to sift through sources of information for a history assignment, inputting written prompts like "find me some quotes for an essay about indentured servitude in Fiji and India.' The students know that any information they obtain must be fact checked before being used. (6)

Currently ChatGPT is banned in most Australian Public Schools but is being used as outlined above in some independent schools. This creates a 'digital divide' which is unfair to public school students and staff. This will be discussed by Education Ministers this year.(6)

The advantages of using ChatGPT have been recognised by some while still banned by many. 'UniSA experts are encouraging teachers to take an active role in testing and using these cutting-edge tools to maintain a competitive edge in their profession'(7)

Plagiarism is the main fear for teachers and educational institutions. 'We already know that managing AI for out-of-class assignments could be challenging, but perhaps it's indicative of the need to change traditional assessment models so that they better match modern learning needs?'(7)

Al is here to stay. It is already used in a variety of ways that impact our lives. Al relies on a base of current knowledge and the concern is 'the amplification of systems and social problems that already exist.' Bias and Discrimination are already built into our current data. We need to be aware of this otherwise the increased use of Al will compound our current problems. However, Mr Marcus Veerman,

CEO and Founder of Playground Ideas suggests that "If AI helps us to learn and work better and faster,

and it does a significant proportion of the grudge work, then humans will be freed to level up to new kinds of work, which has the potential to be far more creative, empathic, socially, focused, and human'(8)

Control of AI

The use of AI is now so widely spread that some of the associated dangers have been recognised. This week an AI Safety Summit was organised at Bletchley Park, England. More than 25 nations attended and 'China agreed to work with the United States, European Union and other countries to collectively manage the risk from artificial intelligence aimed at charting a safe way forward for the rapidly evolving technology.

Some tech executives and political leaders have warned the rapid development of AI poses an existential threat to the world if not controlled, sparking a race by governments and international institutions to design safeguards and regulation.' (9,10,11)

It is now more important than ever that girls and women become involved in the development of Al into the future and become heavily involved on the controls that are being implemented at high levels of government in many countries.



Queensland Medical Women's Society 2023

The QMWS has had a wonderful year under the presidency of Dr Ira van der Steenstraaten.

Our AGM was held on the 28th February after our February dinner at the United Service Club when Dr Anita Sharma gave us a talk entitled "Matters of the Heart in 2023 – are women the forgotten species?" She reminded us that heart disease kills three times as many women as breast cancer and the perception is that women are of lower risk. Fifty-three percent of women are told that their symptoms are not cardiac in origin. Perhaps this is partly because women tend to present with different symptoms than men do. Risk factors can start years beforehand as women who experience pre-eclampsia, gestational diabetes and give birth to a pre-term babies are all at higher risk of experiencing heart disease in later years. Women are also twice as likely to die by the six month post-discharge visit. Mrs Kathy Cavanagh, the National Council of Women in Queensland (NCWQ) had a Purple Bush Medicine Leaves scarf presented to her by Dr Lydia Pitcher, kindly donated by Ms Pia Du Pradal in appreciation of all the work she does each year with the QMWS bursaries. Lucinda Connolly, recipient of the 2022 AMAQ/QMWS Professor Tess Cramond Memorial Bursary spoke about what winning this bursary had meant to her.

Our May Dinner Meeting was addressed by Dr Johanna Skinner who is a GP at Camp Hill as well as a published writer. She talked about how GPs become trusted as the keeper of our patients 'stories. She told us the journey of how she became a doctor, which really started when she got rheumatic fever and Sydenham's chorea as a child. After graduating from Flinders University, she has worked in Burnie, Tasmania, the Fleurieu Peninsula in South Australia, Canberra, Murwillumbah as well as Ireland for a year with her three children when her husband was the house husband. She has also collected an anthology about the COVID pandemic. During the evening we commemorated our friend and colleague, radiation oncologist Assoc. Prof. Brigid Hickey who has just passed away from pancreatic cancer. Dr Catherine Yelland also spoke about whether the QMWS and/or the Australian Federation of Medical Women should draft an official statement with regards to the "Voice to Parliament" referendum.

The August Dinner Meeting was first addressed by Professor Catherine Jones, an I-Med consultant radiologist, recognized in the 2021 Brilliant Women in Digital Health awards, who gave us a sneak peak into her current work, looking at how AI can be utilized in the field of radiology. Dominique Lamb is the Queensland Small Business Commissioner. She spoke about how she had started off as a lawyer but she unexpectedly ended up in business roles, now working in a job where she excels as an empowered leader. SIMNI Sponsored NCWQ Bursaries

This is the 8th Year that we have partnered with NCWQ to sponsor a Bursary. For the past five years, it was for a tertiary student completing their final year in the Creative Arts Industry and in the past three years it has been for a student in her final year of study in Vet Science. We have been delighted to offer tertiary membership to our Bursary recipients and continue to support them as they embark on their careers.

SIMNI Membership

Our membership continues to grow with a broad range of ages, professions and cultural diversity including members now living in China, the UK and Papua New Guinea. At this year's annual SIMNI IWD Be Inspired Forum and Awards we launched our SIMNI Lead-Her-Ship Mentoring Programme, this will continue into 2024. In October we facilitated a Mental Health Workshop and we continue to work in collaboration with other organisations to support women and in particular teen parents and women survivors of domestic abuse and sexual assault. Our advocacy activities continue to ensure that Women's Voices are included in deliberations and decision-making processes that impact on our lives. In July 2023, three SIMNI members attended the Soroptimist International Convention in Dublin and facilitated / participated in workshops.

SIMNI Gender Equality

Educate to Lead continues to be one of our major areas of focus including activities relating to early learning and literacy for under 5's, monthly Tribal Lunches and Resources for the Kairos Community College, supporting Away From Base Graduate Midwives attending the Weemala Aboriginal Campus at the Australian University and working in partnership with Women's Network Australia to provide access to online digital training for women.

Plans are evolving to pilot a new project in the Darapap Village on the Murik Lakes in Papua New Guinea. This is led by one of our SIMNI members and the local women from 120 households to establish home and community vegetable gardens. The income generated from the sale of produce at local markets is invested into purchasing more seeds, schooling, and medical supplies. We hope to expand this project to another four surrounding villages.

It gives me immense pleasure to present the president of Search Light Inc.'s annual report on behalf of all members of Search Light Inc.

Search Light Inc. is dedicated to improving educational and social outcomes for young people and children, and empowering them to participate fully in the social, cultural, and economic life of the community. Throughout 2023 our major focus has been managing the Search Light Early Learning Centre (https://www.searchlightinc.org.au/what-we-do/search-light-early-learning-centre) which provides early childhood education to the children of young mothers who are continuing their education or going to work, and providing specialized family support for the young parents. Search Light Inc. continued to work with closely Carinity Education Southside (https://carinity.qld.edu.au/southside/) and Hymba Yumba Independent School (https://hymbayumba.gld.edu.au/), at Springfield, the families associated with these schools, and

We have achieved several goals outlined in last year's report. We have increased our enrolments at the Search Light Early Learning Centre, and now 70% of our attendees are Indigenous children. Thanks to the dedication and commitment of our energetic Director, our Lead Educator, a qualified early education practitioner, and our caring and compassionate staff, we offer a rich child development and early education programme. Our Director is a recognised leader in the field of trauma management, in the Search Light Early Learning Centre, in academic circles and in the broader community.

Our relationship with Hymba Yumba Independent School (HYIS) has greatly improved. Search Light Inc. members enjoy attending HYIS functions, one HYIS staff member is an ex-officiio member of the Search Light Inc. Management Committee. Our Treasurer is now on the Search Light Education board as a company member.

Unfortunately, we haven't attracted any new members to Search Light Inc. this year. This continues to be a high priority goal and has been incorporated into our strategic plan.

Our new vehicle finally arrived earlier in 2023. That, combined with a grant from Transport and Main Roads for staff to attend car restraint fitting training, and the persistence and great flexibility of our Director and staff, we have maintained a compliant and working transport service for young mothers and their babies coming to the Search Light Early Learning Centre.

Our relationship with Carinity Education Southside continues to strengthen. We value that relationship and the contributions of the Principal and Deputy Principal to our Management Committee meetings, as well as their day-to-day relationship with the Director.

This year members of the Search Light Inc. Management Committee attended both the Hymba Yumba Independent school and Carinity Education Southside Graduation ceremonies to present the winners of the 2023 Jenny Medland Search Light Inc. Bursary. Both ceremonies were impressive, joyous, loving, inclusive events - a joy to attend.

I would like to thank our generous donors for their ongoing support, especially Ms Helen Ashdown, as well as our funding bodies, the Australian Government Department of Education, and the Australian Government Department of Social Services.

I would like to pay tribute to the professionalism and dedication of our director who creates a caring environment for babies, children, young mothers and their families, and staff. We have retained most of our key staff members and this is testament to the inclusive and rewarding working environment of the Search Light Early Learning Centre and to the staff's commitment to Search Light Inc.'s vision and the wonderful families we support.

Thank you to our Secretary, Victoria Lomax, for her meticulous approach to her role, her valuable contributions to meetings and planning and her ongoing commitment to Search Light Inc.

Carla Loodewijk has been a great asset to the Management Committee, bringing her expertise and a fresh approach to our discussions and planning as well as working closely with our director. Thank you for your valuable involvement, Carla.

I am very grateful for the dedication and skill of our Treasurer, Nicola Free. Nicola is so much more than a Treasurer. She is the glue that binds the organization. Not only has she successfully managed the financial challenges to maintain a high-quality service she often helps at the Search Light Early Learning Centre when the unexpected happens and initiates important events such as our Strategic Planning day.

Overall, 2023 has been a successful year for Search Light Inc. We have fulfilled our mission, and we acknowledge and accept what has worked in the past and move into the future seeking new ways to maintain our viability and service to babies, their young mothers, and their families.








Brisbane Women's Club Bursary




Mackenzie Wedrat



I'm not sure what my future career holds, but I do want to advocate for those not able to advocate for themselves. I am especially passionate about gender studies, so hope to help vulnerable persons who have been affected by domestic/family violence or sexual assault.




